Pastor's Ponderings

From a book entitled *Turning Points: Decisive Moments in the History of Christianity* by Mark A. Knoll, 1997, published by Baker Academic, I read this: "Among the last words that Jesus spoke to his disciples were statements recorded in Matthew, chapter 28, and Acts, chapter 1. These words, though they are important for many reasons . . . they mainly speak of the first great turning points in Christianity: 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. . . . Therefore go and make disciples of all nations. . . . Surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age. You will be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth.' "

I found that if you strung all these varied citations from Christ together, you would get a mighty powerful statement for your life and ministries: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations for surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age because you will be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth." - The gospel according to Pastor Bettye!

With these words written into our hearts we certainly could bear witness to some very interesting and life changing or turning points in our lives and in the lives of ours!

You know what a turning point is, right? A turning point is an event that causes us to "turn" from our normal course of actions into another course of action, life, style, way of thinking and believing and then NOTHING is ever the same again! Weddings, childbirths, funerals, new jobs, new relationships, and a renewed relationship with God and your fellow human all very important turning points in our lives and in the life of the church. I like to think that even summer camp is a "turning point" for all the children who will come through our doors. Sending out a pastor and receiving a new one are major tuning points in the life of a congregation.

Our deacon students were required to study the "turning points" in the history of Christianity. They learned that the Fall of Jerusalem, the Great schism, the French revolution and ten other great historical events shaped and projected Christianity into the world faith that it is today. Whether they liked this course or not they did admit to me as their teacher that they learned a lot about the



effects that "turning points" have on the lives of us all. This is why some of the great words of Jesus are so important in how we address our "turning points" with Jesus as the one securing the road in front of us despite the twists and turns:

"All authority I heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations for surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age because you will be my witnesses...to the ends of the earth."

I find these words so very comforting and empowering as a child of the loving God seeking to walk the roads in my life, navigating me through my ministry with Jesus. I think these words will continue to guide Trinity and her disciples in the years to come.

God's blessings to all who are on the road together facing the turning points to God's glory!

From the Organ Bench

Dear Flock,

These words are selected from Exodus 3. The full reading is Exodus 3:1-12.

¹Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of

God. ²There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. ³Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." ⁴When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." ⁵Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." ¹²He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

What does the term "holy ground" mean to you? I must be honest. When I was growing up I never thought about it. Yes, I heard the story of Moses and the burning bush but left it, with an "isn't that nice" kind of response to it. When I was in youth group and we would sing the song, "I am Standing on Holy Ground." It was nice, too. I just never gave it much thought, and it was never adequately explained.

One of the daily devotionals I use is called *Bread for the Journey*. It's an Augsburg Fortress publication, and it has a main scripture, other readings for the day, a hymn text, and concludes with a prayer. It's great. In mid-May, this Exodus scripture hunted me down again. I thought about the holy ground thing all over again and spent some time pondering, "Where is exactly is my holy ground?" Well again, to be honest, if we're really tuned into where holy ground is, and if we're totally honest with ourselves, we will know exactly where this holy of all holy places is located.

Is holy ground that place only known to Biblical characters? Or can we as God's ambassadors be part of a holy ground experience? Well, certainly the concept comes from burning bush story in Exodus, but think back over times and events in your lifetime . . . haven't you had experiences of holy ground? I sure have. The most recent was the Confirmation Service on Pentecost Day here at Trinity. Amazing. Great words, great Spirit, great "presence" of the Holy Spirit, surrounded that place.

Here is how you find holy ground:

- 1. You must be open and trusting that the presence of God will join you. We don't have to be a Noble Prize winner or discover a cure for something. All God expects is for us to be who we are, in the best possible way.
- 2. You must be welcoming and hospitable to the Spirit. The Spirit is with us always, but it will be a little more meaningful if you and I acknowledge its presence. How did Moses respond? "Here I am." Go back to Advent and the Magnificat reading. What did Mary say? "Here am I, the servant of the Lord." What if Mary had said, "You've got to be kidding?" or "Oh no, not for me." That response might have changed the course of things, to say the least!
- Embrace the task that lies ahead. Be a positive role model. Having a bad attitude, using harsh words, etc.

 is ALSO a role model, especially for our young people or those searching for their holy ground experience. And yes, people notice. Ponder that a spell.
- 4. Watch as a sense of community blossoms from this love-giving/love-promoting experience.

You see when God was sending Moses back to Egypt to demand the release of the Israelites from slavery, Moses had a "Yes, but!" moment and said he wasn't a good spokesperson. So, God provides Aaron to become his spokesperson. Several Biblical scholars promote the fact that in the Magnificat, Luke presents Mary as a prophet and Jesus as her oracle. The presence of God will prevail . . . maybe not the way we envision, but there will be a way. Great things/possibilities come from the least likely places and people.

So, be open to becoming Holy Ground for something or someone. Be a tutor. Work in the Food Pantry and Clothing Bank. The need seems endless, but not insurmountable. Have faith! Embrace the task! The Holy Ground will be under your feet everywhere you go. And, just like Moses and Mary and countless others, we can be servants of God who embody faith and faithfulness!

THIS IS YOUR MINISTRY!

Jesus was highly criticized for ministering to the outcasts, the poor, the sinful, the forgotten: tax collectors, adulterers, the blind, the lame, prostitutes, lepers, half breeds, the possessed, prosecutors, the sad, the wounded, and the weary. He loved people by socializing with and ministering to them. Jesus gave us the model of His life to

- It doesn't matter if we don't approve of their lifestyle.
- It doesn't matter if they are promiscuous.
- It doesn't matter if they don't provide for their family and we think they are lazy.
- It doesn't matter if they are prideful.
- It doesn't matter if they are dishonest or strange, weird, sick or shabby.

Trinity opens its door three times a week to these people, which Pastor Bettye named Trinity's third congregation. Every one currently volunteering in outreach is working to offer help to those

who come, but many of us also discover a deep connection with the holy when we encounter the forgotten individual. The simple act of giving someone the basics for survival connects us in a caring that transcends the differences between us.

I sat in the pews or the choir for more than 10 years admiring Trinity's ongoing outreach to the neighborhood. In fact it was one of the major reasons my husband and I joined this church. Remembering that one day, I realized I was not putting my time where my heart is. So I volunteered, two years ago. Now I can't imagine my life without it: the team fellowship and the interaction with our guests are ways we are lighting a candle rather than cursing the darkness.


Now consider how you can support Social Outreach at Trinity with your heart and your help to keep this outreach going. Many of our volunteers work for years, then retire, move away, or stop for health reasons. If the help needed to operate is not received from volunteers, our outreach programs will dwindle and eventually end. And so it may be.

But if the Holy Spirit is leading us to continue, and even grow, we need a few new "workers in the field" who are willing to invest a little time that makes a clear statement of how you value this ministry:

- A volunteer to pick up food at Shop & Save with Trinity's van and carry the full boxes into the Pantry on Tuesdays
- Persons to substitute for regular workers (when they're sick or traveling) in Food & Clothing (this is infrequent)
- A volunteer once a week to drive North Point vets to

the V.A. in Martinsburg (the day varies)

• For seven days in June only, drivers to pick up food at Shop & Save and carry it into the Trinity Food Pantry while two of our regular volunteers are out of town on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays (June 6,7,and 8; June 13,14, and 15; and June

As the body of Christ, we have many parts with many

different gifts with which to serve. Not everyone is called to serve with the downtrodden and the marginal in society. If you can't physically help or you work during the hours that the Food Pantry and Clothing Bank are open, you can express your support for the ministry by completing a Social Ministry Survey we will ask you to fill out soon, or at the next Congregational Meeting. We need to determine what our congregation's vision for outreach is, now and in the future. Do you support what we're doing? Would you support growing our outreach efforts by joining with a coalition of churches and food banks to minister to Hagerstown's needs? Would you like to see us counseling, teaching our guests how to cook to better feed their families healthy meals, and giving our guests contact information on where to receive help in other areas of their lives? Your response on this survey will determine the future of Social Ministry at TLC.

You can also continue to contribute to the Food Pantry, the Clothing Bank, and Micah's Backpack program. And continue to pray for your teams who are working every week with those many would rather ignore. Thanks be to God who has brought us together in this place to love and to serve!

What Do I Leave You With? Thoughts from a Pastor Leaving a Call

Simply, I leave you with part of my heart. For a pastor to truly participate in God's work within a congregation, the pastor must fall in love with the people of God to whom he or she is sent.

I will not leave you with a list of instructions; my best instructions came from our Bible Study and sermon time together. I will leave you with a request that I believe will make the difference in the life or death of the church:

³⁴"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if



you love one another."—John 13:34-35

Loving, forgiving, listening, visiting, praying, feeding, and even gentle rebuking of loved ones gives us a life together that creates a strong

bond that has nothing to do with a building, a town, family ties, or imagined rites through pedigree. Those verbs I mentioned are for all of God's children, and you can love that deeply when you love God first. You can love those sent to you from outside your walls when you love God first! Worship, prayer, and Bible Study will bring you closer to the God I leave you to, trusting in His tender mercies to guide you into a future to God's glory.

Dear friends in Christ, you have been planted in a new season in the life of Hagerstown and Trinity. Christian love and discipleship will be the water that will cause you to bloom and grow. My prayers are that you remember this in the journey ahead.
